It is with sadness that I report the passing of Marcus Beale. Marcus is a charter member of the Lynchburg Gem and Mineral Society, a contributor to its Journal, and a member well known in the Roanoke Mineral and Gem Society.

In the early '90s he and his second wife Marie moved their retirement business, The Amherst County Gem Shop, into the Lynchburg Farmers Market. For years customers became friends at the Shop until illness forced them to close.

Many will remember their introduction of a new type of gem, a tough waste-material-quartzite partially saturated with near invisible silica called "Andamooka Opal". Marcus' work with the importer perfected a treatment that turns the tan base color to black which exposes flashes of color, thus allowing many to inexpensively enjoy fine Australian opal for the first time. Great beauty, plus hardness and durability are the unusual characteristics of this rare opal.

Fondly remembered too is his pronouncement of the jewelry term, bezel, about which he had read. Marcus was self-taught in the rock and gem business and pronounced the word "beezel" as in bee since he had not previously heard the word pronounced. Many of his customers and friends still pronounce the term very distinctly and incorrectly.

Marcus is appreciated by gem cutters for his contribution to the science of faceting. His Ohmmeter approach for better hand control, which was purposely not patented to afford greater usage, has allowed a multitude of amateur and professional gem cutters worldwide to achieve a degree of perfection that previously was rarely obtained. Many added the device to their own machines. Manufacturers of faceting equipment today acknowledge his contribution to their equipment with his name. Faceters around the world through the United States Faceter Guild placed flowers and an acknowledgement honoring his accomplishment by his casket. Marcus is survived by one son, Marcus Beale, II, seven stepchildren, twenty-four grandchildren and thirty-five great grandchildren.

Marcus and I first met at Central Virginia Community College in the early '70s where we studied parapsychology. With his background in electronics, one of his contributions was the replication of a contact photography device invented in Russia know as a Kirlian Camera. This electronic/chemical camera photographs the complete outline of a leaf even after part of the leaf has been torn away. One of the concepts suggested in class was: what comes around goes around.

Years later at the Farmers Market, we renewed our friendship when he and I discovered that we had had another interest in common, rocks and gems. With the rebirth of the Lynchburg Gem and Mineral Society, the editor of the Journal asked for article from members. Prompted, I began to write a series of monthly articles about faceting titled, "Scratches from the Master Lap" which documented discoveries from my learning curve. Marcus field-tested faceting suggestions before publication. Soon, Marcus and I began tweaking our faceting machines for better production, which culminated in the development of the Ohmmeter application. Marcus made the breakthrough discovery and I developed cutting techniques and published the idea worldwide on the Internet through the early "Faceters Digest" chat room.

The rest is history. I will miss Marcus but I will feel his presence when I facet or when ever I appreciate a store-bought gem that I know by the quality of the cutting was inspired by, if not actually cut with, a Beale/Woolley Depth of Cut Indicator.
