Did you know that granite is a plutonic rock? Granite rocks last and are very durable. They are used in making monuments and statutes. Granite rocks are categorized into four types depending on the mechanism of formation. The I-type granite is formed from igneous rock. The S-type granite has a sedimentary origin. The M-type granite is associated with the earth's mantle. And the A-type granites form near hot spots. Granite rocks make great pet rocks because of their plutonic origins. And now you know.



February Program

Sam and Sharon Dunaway, Owners of the Morefield Mine in Amelia County, VA were our very special guests for the program of our March meeting. Sam has a degree as a Mining Engineer, and spent many years in Alaska. He talked about minerals and resources in Alaska, and we had the opportunity to view slides from their most recent trip to Alaska in 2006. Sam also shared details with us concerning the daily operations and production of the Morefield Mine, which he and his wife Sharon own and operate here in Virginia. The

Morefield Mine is a highly mineralized pegmatite, and is probably most renowned for it's pretty green amazonite. Although the amazonite is what folks seem to associate directly with the mine, it produces over 70 different minerals that can be collected during a visit to the mine collecting area.

According to Sam, most of the work is done at the 100 ft. level of the mine, and all of the materials are hand shoveled into the bucket that lifts the material out of the shaft to be examined above ground.

Sam shared his excitement with us about their recent find in the mine- they uncovered a large pocket containing some of the largest smokey quartz and appetite crystals ever found at this mine. This is their first big discovery since becoming owners of the mine. WOW!

Thanks go to Sam and Sharon for navigating their way through Lynchburg to join us and share these educational and enjoyable experiences with the club. It was our pleasure to have you both as our guests.

COMBINED MINERAL COLLECTING FIELD TRIP

The Gem and Mineral Society of Lynchburg Inc. and Roanoke Valley Mineral and Gem Society Inc.

Saturday, March 24, 2007 10:00 am until 4:30 pm MOREFIELD MINE (FEE SITE)

TRIP: We will be visiting the famous Morefield Mine in Amelia, Virginia. We will dig and collect in the old dumps, collect from newly mined material, wash your finds in the sluice line and have the rare opportunity to tour the underground mine workings. There will be picnic tables available on a first come basis. Each club should bring food and drink if we want to have a picnic lunch. We must bring our own lawn chairs and a grill. The closest fast food is McDonalds back several miles in Amelia. This is the opening day for the season so there may be many other visitors as this mine.

COLLECTING: In addition to the beautiful green amazonite, there will be white clevelandite, several types of mica, massive white topaz, garnet, beryl and others. This mine is noted for many micro minerals that most people just discard. A gold pan is a great way to separate the heavier rare minerals, Take the concentrate home in a container, dry and observe under magnification.

FEES: General adult admission and collecting area: \$12.00 each; Children 3 and under free.

Children: Age 4 thru grade 3 (\$7.00); Grade 4 thru 6 (\$8.00); Grade 7 thru 12 (\$10.00)

Underground: \$20.00 each (see restrictions and limitations below) Combination Price: \$30.00 collecting area and underground tour. **SPECIAL CONDITIONS**: Restrictions on diaging in the dump. No picks or malls, no breaking rocks due to the danger of injuring those nearby. There is a one five-gallon bucket limit with each paid admission. Be sure to bring your own bucket. Additional bucket loads may be purchased for a reasonable fee. You will find a

Restrictions on the underaround mine tour. Must ao as a group of 8 or less. The first group tour is about 1:00 PM. The second group will be after 3:30 PM if needed. The tour will take a between 1.5 to 2 hours. Everyone will have Hazard Training instruction and sign a release. You must wear the mine supplied M-65 Self-Rescuer. A hard hat is required so be sure to bring your own. You must wear good strong boots with good soles for traction. Athletic or tennis shoes are not permitted. You must bring your own personal light source. You may also want to bring a camera or camcorder. They must be carried on your body or in a small shoulder bag. Both hands must be free for climbing the ladders. The trip into the mine requires climbing ladders. The main level is 45 feet below the surface and the other levels are at 32 feet and 60 feet. It is a requirement that visitors be able and healthy enough to climb into and out of the mine under their own power.

Junior Cash Awards At Roswell

Exciting news and a challenge from the Chaparrell Rockhounds, hosts or the 2007 AFMS and RMFLS Show. We would like to invite all the other federations of the AFMS to participate in our Junior Cash Award Program. It entails the following:

There are two \$25.00 cash awards given; one to a junior aged between 6-12, and the other to a junior aged 13-17. Each junior may enter one specimen only, in one of the following categories:

1. Minerals; 2.Lapidary & Petrified Wood; 3. Fossils; 4.Jewelry (using specimen collected in field) The junior must collect the specimen him/herself. Then he/ she needs to make a label that identifies the specimen (e.g. AQUAMARINE, QUARTZ) classifies it (e.g. sulfide, carbonate, silicate, oxide, etc), says where it was found, and states the name of the junior's club. If the specimen is a fossil, it should also state the period from which it came. The specimen should be mounted on a base or stand to best display the specimen. No personal name of the junior should be on the label.

The junior must submit an entry form to me no later than May 1st.

- ?? Dave Woolley is working on a geology trip with a tape recorder, GPS, and making programs members can use to guide them to sites they can explore on their own throughout the different regions in VA.
- ?? Tom or "T" Upshur has requested an article for the Appalachian Trail newsletter about our club. Dee and Natalie will put one together. Unfortunately, Mr. Upshur did not return my call until the night of March 6th and the article was due the 7th. We did send a paragraph to them including our mission statement, our meeting place and time and our officer's names and titles. There may not be space enough this quarter, but she would use it for the next along with an article we submit. This would be an article about our club education and activities.

It's painless, it's fun, and it's interesting! But it does not happen until YOU make it happen! Go ahead, complete the bio form.



Why Different Cuts?

The Rounded surface of a **cabochon** enhances opaque and translucent stones as well as optical effects such as stars and cat's eyes.

The flat surface of a **step cut** allows abundant light to enter, bringing out the color of emeralds, rubies, and other intensely colored stones.

The facets of a **brilliant cut** refract light, which shows off diamonds and other fiery gems. Variations include marquise and pear cuts.

There are platforms about every 12 feet where one can rest but remember that physical exertion is required. The vertical ladder ways are tight and large people and backpacks may not fit. The final decision on who will be permitted to enter the mine is up to the mine owner. Children are not permitted to enter the mine. Only older teenagers when accompanied with a parent. Dress according to the surface temperature. There will be some dripping water especially on the 60-foot level so a light rain lacket may be useful. There may also be some wet floors. No mineral collecting will be permitted underground.

DIRECTIONS: Meet at the mine between 9:30 and 10:00 AM. The mine is located in Amelia County. VA. From US 360 just East of the McDonalds traffic light in Amelia, turn right on Rt. 628 (look for the brown State Morefield Mine sign). The mine entrance will be about 9/10 of a mile on the left. Follow the driveway all the way to the parking area, office and gift shop.

If you want to drive as a group, we will meet at the Jumbo Restaurant on US 460 East just past the Lynchburg Citv limits in Campbell County. We will DEPART there at 8:00 AM. drive 460 thru Farmville and take Rt. 307 to US 360 and stop at the McDonalds in Amelia for a short break. The mine is only a couple of miles from there.
