Calcite is the mineral for December. Calcite is calcium carbonate with a chemical formula of CaCO3 and is in the hexagonal crystal system. Calcite crystals take many forms. Calcite crystals show rhombohedron, scalenohedron, and prism forms. Aragonite is a polymorph of calcite because aragonite has the same chemical formula as calcite but a different crystal structure. Calcite is considered point group bar3m whereas aragonite is considered point group mmm. Calcite connects the intellect with the emotions and creates emotional intelligence. Directions: The Diamond Hill Mine is located near the small town of Antreville in northeastern South Carolina.





I've found about 75-90% of the 3rd graders I've worked with are familiar with the games of "Go Fish" and the "Memory Game". Both can be played with a deck of pairs of cards (often cartoons or animals) but rocks and minerals are much more interesting and attractive. I made the cards by making 2 copies of easily recognizable rocks and minerals and added the names with the computer. Our local copy shop was quite a help and they also laminate so the cards last so much better. Of course "Go Fish" became "Go Rockhound"! I made 30 cards (15 pairs) and if 3 or 4 students play the game each gets 5 cards to begin the game. The most pairs wins and I love hearing the comments; "Do you have calcite?" "No, go rockfind-I mean rockhound!" or "Go fish "Not fish, silly, we're rockfinding!"

The memory game can use the same 30 cards laid face down in a neat pattern. Each student turns 2 over; if they match they take the pair and go again, if they do not they turn

them back over and the next student takes a turn. "Old Maid" or "Old Miner" would need a single extra card; maybe a cartoon of an old "49er. I bring tumbled rocks for prizes (food works great too). There must be a way to redesign poker, but I haven't gotten that far yet. Hmmm, there's diamonds, maybe crystals, geodes...

From the north: Exit I-85 at US 178 at Anderson, SC (exit # 21). Drive south on US 178 for approx. 1 mile and then bear right onto SR 28. Follow SR 28 south approx. 20 miles to Antreville. Upon entering Antreville you will see Crawford's Store on the left. Drive past the store and then watch on the right for Emanuel Baptist Church. Turn right at the church onto SR 284. Drive east on SR 284 for 2.3 miles watching carefully on the right for Suber Road (S-01-508). Turn right onto Suber Road and follow it approx. 0.7 mile to Diamond Hill Road (on right, gravel, S-1-538). Turn right onto Diamond Hill Road and follow it about 0.5 miles. The mine entrance will be on the right. From the south: Exit I-20 at US 221 (exit # 183) just east of Augusta, Georgia. Drive north on US 221 to McCormick, SC. In McCormick turn north onto SR 28. Continue north on SR 28 to Antreville (approx. 50 miles). About 2 miles south of Antreville, SR 184 enters SR 28 from the right (east). When you pass SR 184 start watching carefully on the left for Emanuel Baptist Church. Turn left at the church onto SR 284. Drive east on SR 284 for 2.3 miles watching carefully on the right for Suber Road (S-01-508). Turn right onto Suber Road and follow it approx. 0.7 mile to Diamond Hill Road (on right, gravel, S-1-538). Turn right onto Diamond Hill Road and follow it about 0.5 miles. The mine entrance will be on the right.

Other Essentials: Pick and shovel, rock hammer, chisels, and scratching tools. There is ample water on site for screening and washing specimens. Bring a lunch, plenty of fluids, hat, gloves, and sturdy shoes. Bring rubber boots and a change of cloths if it is going to be a rainy or wet day.

Fees: Adults = \$15/day

Children under 16 year of age = $\frac{6}{day}$.

Also, upon arrival, each participant will be required to sign a waiver of liability
