Presidents Message

Hello To All,

There was a lot of material covered at the July 17 meeting. We announced the purchase of two specimen collections with lapidary equipment included. The collection of William & Jocelyn Willoughby, which spanned a number of decades, and the partial collection of Joe Moore, both of Wytheville, VA. Some nine truck loads of goodies is being stored at the Club's workshop, at Dave Callahans, where beginning August 10th all interested members are invited to help go through and sort the material into categories of like slab material, cabbing rough, specimens for the silent auction as well as for the Club's November Auction. There are a number of flats of thin sliced material, that was planned for making rock lamp shades that should be sorted by color and like material. The most time consuming project will be viewing and identifying the some 300 fluorescent mineral specimens to be used by the Club in the Roanoke Gem & Mineral Show fluorescent room display. At least now we won't have to go looking for specimens to fill our 24 feet of display cases. Dave Woolley will be in the lead on the fluorescent mineral cleaning and labeling. If you want to have a crash course in mineral identification as well as handle some rare specimens of turquoise, petrified wood, fossils etc, come on out and join us on August 10th at the work shop. Several more days of sorting and cleaning will be announced at the August 21 meeting.

The Club also voted to participate in the Jefferson Choral Society Holiday Bazaar, on Nov 23rd at the #715 Moose Lodge on Lakeside Drive in Lynchburg. More details for this at upcoming meetings. There was also a motion to purchase special copies of the Diamond Dan Publications of mineral activity books. The Club will receive for free a PDF file with permission to print up to 500 copies of the book "World Of Minerals" that we can use for Rock Raider meetings or sell at the Festivals for a nominal price, to encourage new collectors and those interested in all phases of rock collecting.

The Club was contacted by the College of New Jersey, to help in conducting a geological experiment, MAGIC, Mid-Atlantic Geophysical Integrative Collaboration. MAGIC involves the installation of 28 seismometers, and is part of national Earthscope project. Our own Mary DeViney has been chosen to

2nd VP Report

Past Field Trip

The Enterprise Manganese Mines Appomattox County, VA. July 27, 2013

The weather was a bit iffy this morning but we were spared but for a very slight drizzle late in the day that was over almost before it started. We were in clear and sunny skies most of the day. We ended up with 17 people and I am sure that the gloomy forecast must have deterred those that chose not to attend.

There were many positive property and road improvements since my last visit maybe 8 years ago. We could only drive four wheel drive vehicles down the mine road because of rain the day before and early Saturday morning. There was a small parking area at the bottom of the hill and room for one or two trucks to park adjacent to the mining area half way up the hill. Thom used his truck to carry all our tools and buckets while we walked. There were vast areas for collecting, many of which were overgrown and covered with leaf matter. We scattered thru the woods and lit into likely piles of ore. Several of us found, hiding in the large ore boulders, some beautiful pockets filled with small beautiful crystals. Some were manganite and others were small quartz crystals covered with black manganese or brown limonite coating that was very stunning under a 10 power loupe. There were other small crystals in vugs but we will strive to determine an identity for these.

We departed in the late afternoon, tired, dirty and very pleased with our finds. We all look forward to a return visit next year or perhaps again this fall if there is sufficient interest.

All club field trip leaders send me a list of your total collectors so that I can compile a list and forward to the mine management by 9-26-13. There is a total limit of 100 collectors from all clubs for this event so there should be room for everyone.

SAFETY: Everyone should arrive at the office parking lot between 8:30AM and no later than 8:45AM for the required safety briefing. Each Club field trip leader, or his appointed replacement, will act as safety observer and will be expected to be on the lookout for and correct all safety infractions from any collector. Keep in mind that this site is one of the few that is still open for collecting. **Not obeying all the safety rules will cause this site to be closed to all future collecting.**

DRIVING FROM THE ROANOKE AND LYNCHBURG AREA: From Roanoke, follow US 460 East to Lynchburg, to the Sheets Station on US 460 and Rt. 811 in New London. Continue on the US 460 East by-pass around Lynchburg thru Appomattox and take Rt. 24 North to the end at US 60 at Mt. Rush. Continue on US 60 East to Sprouses Corner. Turn right on US 15 South and drive 4 miles to Willis Mt. Plant Road. Turn left and stop at the

stone mine office and park out of the way as not to block traffic. Allow 1 ¹/₄ minimum hour driving time from New London west of Lynchburg.

GENERAL LOCATION and ASSEMBLY

TIME: Everyone will meet at the mine office for sign-in and safety instruction, be there between 8:30 and no later than 8:45am. The mine is located north of Farmville, Va. On Rt. 15 North. Proceed from US 460 North on Rt. 15 for a little over 12 miles to Willis Mt. Plant Rd. The stone mine office on the right. If you approach from Rt. 60 at Sprouses Corner, then go south on Rt. 15 for 4 miles to Willis Mt. Plant Rd. and the office will be on your left. Wait in the parking lot and do not block traffic. Many trucks may be using the road. While you're waiting, be sure to enjoy the beautiful blue kyanite bolder in the front yard from the old closed Baker Mountain.

COLLECTING: Willis Mountain is what's known as a monadnock. The kyanite exposure resisted weathering and, as the surrounding area was eroded and weathered away, the mountain outcrop was left standing. This is very much like the famous Graves Mountain kyanite mine in Georgia. The center of the mountain has been mostly mined away. We should be able to find plenty of white kyanite blades in the massive kyanite quartzite; pyrite; quartz; hematite with some iridescent, red mica, apatite and possibly some blue kyanite and pale green trolleite. Some of the white kyanite here fluoresces a beautiful light blue as well as some of the quartz.

EQUIPMENT: The standard quarry gear required is hard hats with a mfg. date of 5 years or less, safety glasses, only steel toed boots or very good strong leather boots will **be allowed**, long pants, gloves, hammer and chisels, wrapping paper, buckets, food and water. If you do not have the required safety equipment, you will not be allowed to enter the quarry. Be prepared for windy, hot or wet weather. We will be on the mountain top and it's always windy. We can drive to the designated collecting area, so hand trucks should not be needed. Bring a camera, as the view is awesome.

AGE LIMIT: There is no age limit, but all children must be signed for and supervised by an adult.

WEATHER: The trip will be canceled in case of hard rain or a thunderstorm. Call to confirm if there is any question.

JUST A DROP

Hobby shops and model airplane stores carry small plastic dispenser bottles that are handy bench items for putting a drop of oil or glue just where you want it.

The small metal tubing lets you squeeze out very small drops and reach into tight places.

I use the small one on the left for oil when I'm sawing or drilling harder metals like steel. And I use the

bottle on the right from a plastics store for the fast drying glues used to join pieces of acrylic.



Mineral of the Month-

Tiger's-Eye, by Frank M Craig,

This month we will take a look at the (semiprecious) gemstone tiger's-eye. Tiger's-eye, a variety of quartz, owes its name to the banded yellow-gold, dark brown color, which resembles a tiger's eye. The popularity of this material as a gemstone is because of its chatoyance (cats eye effect- the way light is reflected) on a polished material.

Tiger's-eye occurs in veins, parallel to bedding, usually less than 6cm thick. Historically the origin is considered to be a classic example of pseudomorphism (the replacement of one mineral by another with the new mineral retaining the form of the original mineral). In this case, crocidolite is replaced by quartz. Crocidolite (asbestos) is the trade name for fibrous riebeckite, a blue (alkali) amphibole. The quartz retains the original fibrous structure of the asbestos which gives the material its chatoyance. The resultant yellow to brown color is caused by iron oxide staining (oxidation of the iron in the riebeckite). Unstained pieces (areas) retain the original blue color and are called hawk's -eye.

The replacement theory, first suggested in 1873, was recently challenged. A few researchers now

believe the origin is not a replacement process but a typical crack/seam filling mechanism. Mineral rich fluids infiltrate a pre-existing crack in the rock and deposit the quartz. The quartz shows a distinctive, fibrous, growth pattern extending from the edge of each side towards the center, sealing the crack. Crocidolite fibers are still present but occur as inclusions within the quartz and are believed to grow from fragments originally present on the crack edges. The characteristic color is still caused by iron oxide stain and the fibrous texture produces the characteristic iridescent luster (chatoyance).

Regardless of which origin you subscribe to tiger's-eye is inherently linked to crocidolite and therefore only occurs where deposits of crocidolite are found- South Africa, western Australia, China, and South America. The uses of Tiger's-eye (and hawk's eye) are as gems, most commonly as cabochons. However, people do produce excellent carvings from the material. Additionally, this material plays a significant role in holistic procedures and astrology.


