BEZEL CLOSER

A bezel closer is a steel punch that makes quick work out of pushing the metal down over a round stone and burnishing it. The working end is a concave cavity that fits over your bezel or prong setting and is pushed and twisted to capture the stone. Sets can be purchased but are expensive and contain many sizes you will probably never use. If all you need is one or two sizes, here's how you can make them yourself.

Find a good quality, round steel rod a little larger in diameter than your bezel cup or prong setting. Cut a 5 inch length. File both ends flat. Locate the center of one end, center punch a divot, and drill a small pilot hole about 5 mm deep. Remember to use a little oil as lubricant when cutting steel.

Select a ball bur a bit smaller than the steel rod but slightly larger than the bezel. Enlarge the pilot hole to a full hemispherical cavity. Test for proper fit with your bezel. Bezel should first contact the cavity about a third of the way in. When the size is correct, polish the cavity using Zam on a length of chopstick in your flexshaft. If the tool is not polished, it will leave scratches on your bezel or prongs.

When using the tool, the first step is to capture the stone correctly. I usually work by hand and push the punch straight down over the bezel or prongs. This causes the metal to start bending over the stone. Next I inspect with a lens to be sure the stone is staying level. This is repeated until the stone is seated on its bearing and can't move anymore.

Next you want to force the metal down onto the stone uniformly all the way around. While this can be done by hand, I often gently tap the punch with a hammer. Finally, burnish the bezel by twisting the punch around.

BENCH SHEARS

When cutting sheet metal, it's quicker and easier to use a set of shop shears as compared with using a hand saw. The cut is not as precise, but many times you don't need that. Shears will easily cut up to 24 gauge sheet, and some will cut 22 or even 20 gauge.

Current prices for shears run from \$13 - \$22 in jewelry catalogs, and the Joyce Chen scissors recommended on some jewelry blogs run more than \$20. But we found a cheaper alternative at the 99 Cent Store - some gardening utility scissors that were only \$1.07

I buy a half dozen of them at a time for use in my jewelry classes. They're great for cutting bezels, trimming around a bezel cup and cutting a piece off a larger sheet.

Up Coming Field Trips

**Sign-up required, call me, email me or
sign-up at the meeting—
parking space is limited to 12 cars.**

SPECIAL NOTE: At this date, 3-1-17, we have reached the allotted 12 car parking limit. If others sign up we may need to car pool. We will determine that at the Hardee's meeting spot Saturday morning. Please do not just show up at the site without first letting me know several days in advance..... Thank you

MEETING TIME AND PLACE: We will meet in Amherst, VA, Saturday morning, at the Hardee's Restaurant (114 Ambriar Plaza) on US 29 business no later than 8:30 A.M. We will decide if we need to carpool. We can leave cars here if needed. **We will depart from there promptly 8:45 A.M.**

From Lynchburg and Roanoke, follow US Rt. 460 east / US 29 north by-pass several miles east of Lynchburg. Take the new US Rt. 29 north by-pass across the James River and proceed north to the Amherst US 29 business exit. The Hardee's is in the Ambriar Shopping Center at this exit. Come early and have a bite to eat. We can determine if carpooling is necessary and leave any cars here. From this point, it should take about 45 minutes to arrive at the parking area along Rt. 6. Be sure that you are fueled up and ready to leave by 8:45 A.M. If you are coming from the north, the US 29 business exit will be about 2 miles south of the US 60 exit. If you live in Madison Heights, it might be closer to just follow US 29 business to Amherst. The Hardee's will be on your left at the new US 29 bypass interchange, just before you arrive at the town of Amherst.

Dress for the weather that day and be sure to bring food, water, bug spray and warm clothing. Wear boots, gloves, long pants and safety glasses. Hard hats will not be required.

Due to the restricted parking along Route 6, we must limit attendance to 10 or 12 cars maximum. Only those that call to reserve your place or sign up at the meeting will be allowed to attend. Car-pooling is recommended. We will arrive at a small parking area at the intersection of Rt. 29 North and Rt. 6 East about 9:30AM. We can leave some cars here if necessary and pick up those that will meet us here.

**March Field Trip
COMBINED MINERAL COLLECTING FIELD TRIP
THE GEM AND MINERAL SOCIETY OF LYNCHBURG, VA,
THE ROANOKE VALLEY MINERAL AND GEM SOCIETY,
Saturday, March 25, 2017
OLD FABER MINE, ALBEMARLE COUNTY, VA.**

THE TRIP: I have received special permission from the landowner and he has some rules that must be obeyed. NO SMOKING (extremely dry and a high fire hazard could exist). Keep away from the 3 open shafts and collect only geologic specimens, not historic pieces, and leave NO TRASH. This is a beautiful, classic and historic site and the owner is graciously allowing us to collect here on this day. There are NO facilities at this site or in the immediate area. If you have any physical or medical limitations, this is probably a trip you should not attend. Cell phone service is spotty at best and medical help is hours away.

The mine is about 1.5 miles (a good 45 minute walk) along a gated, mostly level, rutted dirt road. Past logging in the area has made the road rough and possibly muddy in places. Since we must walk in and out, and galena is very heavy, you might want to bring a wagon, hand truck or at the least a good back pack. Good walking shoes are a must and be sure to bring plenty of water and snacks. You'll also need safety glasses, hammers, chisel, and a tool to scratch thru the dirt, overburden and turn over rocks, buckets or bags with newspaper to wrap your delicate specimens. Be watchful where you put your hands and feet as copper heads and rattle snakes are in the area.

COLLECTING: Expect to find **galena** (lead), **sphalerite** (zinc) and **fluorite** (white and purple). Other minerals that exist there are **chalcopyrite, pyrite, pyrrhotite, magnetite, quartz, calcite, cerussite, chalcantite, pyromorphite, kaolinite, azurite, chlorite** and **hydrozincite**. Many of these are fluorescent under ultraviolet lamp.

HISTORY: The mine was discovered in 1849, and operated off and on by the Confederates during the Civil War producing an excess 7,000 pounds of lead, but abandoned when General Sherman crossed the Blue Ridge at Rockfish Gap. In 1905, it was again opened for lead and zinc but closed about 1919. Several other unsuccessful attempts to reopen the mine were short-lived. The 3 shafts are now fully choked, caved and the audit reopened in 1958 is now caved. A dirt, leaf and

forest clutter covered dump still exists and will still yield beautiful specimens after much searching and digging.

We must arrive and walk in together, but you may leave any time you want and walk out by yourself. This is a unique collecting site and we are fortunate to have it in our area. The landowner is willing to share it with us only because we always obtain permission, stay safe, obey his rules and never destroy or trash his property. This is the only reason we are allowed access

to his land.

IMPORTANT !!! Note the attendance limit. Members planning to attend this trip **must** register with **Rosina Echols**, not their club's field trip chair and not the DMC coordinator. TRIP: This is an active gravel pit producing sand and gravel for industries. The site has igneous, metamorphic and sedimentary rocks. The hunt site includes "oversize" rocks culled from commercial gravel. Citronelle gravel is mined from a layer 40 feet below Ice Age loess soil. The abundance of agate, coral and other fossils made this site a favorite last year.

COLLECTING: Expect to find agates, coral and other fossils, geodes, chunks of petrified wood and Sioux quartzite. A few unusual finds included a magnificent

Petoskey stone and a piece of St. Francois Mountain rhyolite.

BRING: We'll hunt around and on tall piles of gravel. Bring a bucket, bag or backpack for collecting as you climb on the gravel piles. A walking staff is helpful but not necessary. Wear close-toed shoes to protect feet. If you need ankle support, wear hiking boots. An extra pair of "muck" boots might be helpful if there is mud. Wear clothes that you won't be afraid to get dirty and bring a change of clothes. Weather may be cold and/or windy. Bring a coat and dress in layers. Expect cold mornings and warm afternoons. If you have allergies or require medication, please bring your medication. Bring water, snacks and drinks. Pack a lunch if you expect to stay until 2 p.m. Bring gloves, hat, sunglasses, sunscreen and a chair.

REQUIREMENTS: The collecting area will be limited to specific gravel piles that will be announced on site. Participants must stay off equipment, away from slopes adjacent to ponds, out of ponds and away from loess walls.

SPECIAL CONDITIONS: We will not park close to the hunt piles. Unless you are very selective, you will make multiple trips to your auto to deposit your finds to avoid potential injury. Footing on the gravel piles can be tricky. People who have stability issues should stay at the bottom of the gravel piles. It will still be good hunting. Walking and digging on steep slopes can lead to slides.

Care must be taken when around the ponds. Stay away from the edge of rock piles against the ponds. This is a remote area and there will be little or no cell phone reception.

REGISTRATION REQUIRED: Registration deadline is Wednesday, March 22. Please let us know if you will attend and the best way to contact you. In case of bad weather or weather damage to the site, we might have to cancel. Spring in Mississippi can bring heavy rain, sleet, or snow as well as crisp, breezy or wonderfully warm weather. CHILDREN: Children are allowed - minimum age 8 years. Adult supervision is required at all times. Children may not throw rocks or run at the site, especially on the gravel piles. Care should be taken when around the ponds. No climbing on equipment is allowed.

PETS: No pets are allowed.

FACILITIES: No stores or facilities are close to the collecting site. A portable toilet will be on the site. At the meeting place before the convoy goes to the site, there will be drinks, snacks, some prepared breakfast/lunch food items, and restrooms.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION: The meeting place is nearly midway between Vicksburg and Jackson, Mississippi. Hotels and restaurants are available in both locations. If you would prefer to stay in the Jackson area, there are a variety of hotels and restaurants available at Exit 48 (Pearl). The Pearl location is a nice area. Vicksburg is a historical area with casinos.

Attendees are invited to attend the MGMS monthly program meeting on Friday, March 24. Our meetings are held at the MGMS Lapidary School, 176 Tazan Avenue, Florence. (Pearl is approximately 10 miles from the MGMS Lapidary School.) MGMS monthly program meetings start at 7:30 p.m.; gathering begins around 7:00. Although the address is Florence, the School is located in a residential area just south of Richland. Detailed directions to the MGMS Lapidary School can be found on the MGMS website - www.missgems.org.

DIRECTIONS AND WHERE TO MEET:

We will meet at 8:00 a.m. Central Time at the Chevron Truck Stop on the south side of I-20 at Exit 27 (Bolton exit). This is west of Jackson and Clinton / east of Vicksburg. Safety Matters, A Case For Attitude

I have an embarrassing story to tell. I am neither proud of, nor happy about relating the story, but here we go. Perhaps you can learn from my mistakes.

Several years ago I was persuading a rock up and out of a hole. The rock was damp and mostly covered with mud. The embarrassing part of the story is that as the rock was protesting, yet grudgingly moving upward, I hurriedly took off my gloves, and with bare hands finished wrestling the rock out of the hole.

Yes I, a huge advocate of safety took off my gloves to get a better grip to maneuver the stone. Surely you can see my dilemma and embarrassment! What I should have done was to select and work with the proper gloves before beginning the procedure of moving that rock.

Safety is an attitude. Safety should be automatic. When I didn't do the right thing, I felt embarrassed. No one saw my mistake, but I know I made it. I'm not going to beat myself up for having made it, but it does call to mind that none of us is perfect, errors occur, but, if attitude is any indication, I felt bad about making a safety mistake.

So what are the lessons to be learned here? Make safety automatic. Do give safety all the additional thought necessary to make everything one does - safe. There are many types of gloves - select the proper ones for the task.

I had initially put on work gloves that protected by fingers, but when damp with mud, had not provided sufficient gripping power. Once the proper gloves have been selected, wear them! There are gloves for water protection on, hammer handle shock protection, cushioned for chisel holding, for better gripping power, for permitting greater dexterity, and for general purpose uses.
