Find the Balance Point

With odd-shaped pendants or earrings it's often difficult to find the right place to attach a bail or loop so that the piece is balanced and hangs straight. A quick way to make a tool for this is to modify a set of tweezers. Any set of tweezers will work. Spread the tips, sharpen them with a file, and bend the tips at a right angle to point towards each other. To use the tool suspend the pendant or earring between two sharp points to see how it will hang.



Drill Breakage

Using a small drill is difficult for a beginner, especially if it is hand held in a flex shaft or Dremel. They are easily broken if you push too hard or if you tilt the drill while it's in the hole. Most problems, however, are the results of buying cheap drills that suffer from poor quality steel or inaccurately ground cutting edges. A good drill from jewelry supply companies is well worth the price. Remember that drilling always goes easier with lubrication. A little wax or oil is all you need. Almost anything will work- Three and One, beeswax, mineral oil injection wax, car ore, olive oil or one of the commercial cutting waxes. The lubricant helps to move chips out of the hole and reduces friction of the drill against the side of the house, keeping the drill cooler.

NEW SAFETY REGULATIONS NOW APPLY...... READ CAREFULLY AND COMPLY

COLLECTING: According to the mindat.org. Web-site, the following minerals are listed from Minerals of Virginia, 1990 edition. Some on this list have not been found on our past field trips. (An (*) indicates those known finds on past field trips)

A greenish-brown replacement of Anatase: ilmenite.Ilmenite: Black metallic or highly weathered masses. (*)Kaolinite: White powdery masses from the alteration of feldspar. (*)

Quartz: Light blue to white (*)Rutile: Reddishbrown metallic to highly weathered masses. (*)

Tacharanite: White, dull to pearly. Occurs with the weathered anatase, rutile and ilmenite.

Zoisite var: Thulite: Veins of pink thulite occur in the feldspar. (*)

Some additional minerals we have also found there: **Pyrrhotite**: (has been verified) (*) Silvery metallic when fresh but weathers to a dark rusty color when exposed to the weather. Pyrite: Small crystals and masses (*) Garnets: Small crystals and masses (*) Muscovite and Biotite Mica: Small crystals and masses (*) Chlorite: Masses (*).

The main rock mined here is called **APLITE**. It is very hard, light-colored, and fine-grained and consists primarily of sodic plagioclase feldspar and quartz in the groundmass and, in some cases, orthoclase feldspar phenocrysts. Like pegmatites, aplite dikes may represent a residual fraction on silica-rich magma after most on the magma has crystallized. It makes great construction material.

Remember that the availability of these minerals depends on where they are working in the quarry at the time of the field trip and how many stock piles are available. Note that some of the occurrences are very small.

DIRECTIONS: From Lynchburg, VA., follow US 29 By-pass north to Amherst. Continue on the US 29 by-pass for about 2 miles until you come to Rt. 151 (Patrick Henry Highway). Turn Left on Rt. 151 and continue for about 6 miles and turn left on RT. 665 (Warrick Barn Road). The entrance road to the quarry will be in about 1 mile on the right.

MEETING LOCATION & ASSEMBLY TIME: 8:15 to 8:30 AM. At the guarry scale house / office. You will need sufficient time to review the Boxley Release and Waiver of Liability along with the Hazard Training information, fill out and sign both the Hazard Training Certificate and sign the required Boxley Waiver of Liability form. There will also be a review of the site specific hazard training and safety regulations by the quarry Superintendent. Everyone must be present for this If you are late, you will not be presentation. permitted to enter the quarry. We all will enter the quarry as a group about 9:00 AM.

All safety rules will be strictly enforced or you will be escorted out of the quarry and barred from future field trips. Our members adhering to the basic safety rules in the past is the only reason Boxley continues allowing us access to their quarry today. Any member not complying with the basic

continued from page 5 safety rules, will be promptly escorted from the quarry and barred from all future field trips.

EQUIPMENT: The Boxley Quarries are very safety-conscious. Standard quarry PPE (Personal Protective Equipment) gear is required or you will not be permitted to enter the quarry. Hard hat (see mfg. date below), steel-toe boots or composite-toe boots (no exceptions), safety glasses and good common sense is required. Also good protective clothing and gloves must be worn. A set of wheel chocks or a suitable rock must be used when parked to be in compliance. The vehicle must be in park and the parking brake applied when leaving the vehicle. It could be very cold, wet or hot in the quarry, so dress according to the weather forecast that morning. Be sure to bring plenty of water and Bring your own collecting equipment snacks. such as rock hammers, chisels, buckets and newspaper to wrap your delicate specimens. We will be allowed to drive into the quarry. Bring rain gear in case of bad weather. HARD HAT NOTICE: CHECK THE MANUFACTURE DATE, LEFT SIDE, UNDER THE BRIM IN THE SMALL CIRCLE ON ETHER SIDE OF THE ARROW. If you see a 1/5 on either side it was made in 2015, a 1/1 is 2011 and out of date. If it's older than 5 years, it must be replaced. This is a new Federal rule enforcement. You must comply or you will be rejected.

AGE LIMIT: All children will be allowed but it will be the parent's responsibility to keep them under tight control and within sight at all times and see that they obey all the safety requirements. The same dress and PPE requirements apply. A ball cap can be worn under a hard hat for a better fit. Also a bicycle helmet is acceptable. Leather boots are acceptable if steel toes are not available in their size. These options are for small children only. If they don't comply, don't bring them! If you have any questions please contact the F.T. leader.

NOTE: Severe weather or other crisis out of our control may result in the canceling or rescheduling of this trip. If there is any question, please call me to confirm the trip.

EFMLS Wildacres Workshop, May 2017-

We ate lunch every day at 12:30 and the afternoon class went from 2:00 to 5:00 p.m. In the last part of the first afternoon class, Richard introduced us to our second project of creating a prong setting for a cabochon. Suffice to say, this design was more complicated and built upon what we had learned in the first project. After class each day we had "happy hour" --- which, for most folks, was a chance to relax before dinner which started at 6:00 p.m. After dinner we had another interesting presentation at 7:30 p.m. by Bob Jones. Wednesday (our second full day) was a repeat of the first day schedule --- morning and afternoon classes plus morning and evening talks by Bob Jones.


The third full day (Thursday) at Wildacres was a "free" day in which we could choose from a variety of activities --- a group trip to Pisgah Astronomical Research Institute (PARI) about two hours away, go hiking, visit Mt. Mitchell, ditto Biltmore Estate or Grandfather Mountain, or whatever. Ann and I decided to go on our own field trip to Marshall --- I went to the Little Pine Garnet Mine and Ann visited the restored old town of Marshall. We each had a good time --- Ann found a nice place to eat and enjoyed the incredible landscaping of "Blue Ridge Day Lilies" while I found some excellent garnets. We finished in time to be back at Wildacres by 4:00 p.m. for "Tailgating" --- a swap and sale held by Wildacres attendees in the Meeting Room (due to more rain I sold some, bought some and swapped some. And had fun. After dinner, the cello group invited everyone to the auditorium for a concert performed by three cello instructors. It was wonderful --- very professional and enjoyable --- easily one of the highlights of our Wildacres experience.

Friday's schedule had a morning presentation by Bob Jones, then morning and afternoon classes and after dinner a "Good stuff" auction was held for the benefit of future EFMLS Wildacres workshops. We were all encouraged to donate items --- I donated four --- a Bishop, California grossular garnet crystal cluster; a turquoise crystals-on-quartz specimen from Lynch Station, Virginia; a small sphere of rose quartz that had a sharp 6-rayed star; and a double penetrating twin pyrite crystal from Navajun, Spain. The donated items from everyone were displayed throughout the day on tables in our Meeting Room. They were all very

interesting items --- minerals specimens, lapidary items like cabs, gem trees and hand carved/polished objects, very nice silver jewelry, weird stuff that had something to do with "moose". People became more excited throughout the day and everyone began looking forward to the auction.



That evening, there were well over 100 lots to bid on and bidding was fast and furious for over two hours. I was tickled that Dr. Mike Wise (Mineralogist at the Smithsonian Museum) got my turquoise crystal specimen --- the only item he bid on all evening. I bid (unsuccessfully) on many items, but I was determined to get one of them --- the "50-Year History of the Tucson Show" authored by Bob Jones. Since the auctioneers kept back that magazine (Special Supplement to The Mineralogical Record 2004) Continued on next page

almost to the very end, I was wondering if Bob Jones would stick around that late to see who got it --- but he did. After an animated and spirited bidding war, I finally had the high bid! Everyone broke out in loud applause because the price had gone pretty high. And Bob autographed it with a great inscription: "To Dave & Jeff --- Keep collecting. See you in Tucson! Bob Jones 5/17". Wow! I was thrilled. The auction raised something over \$4,000. The next day, someone added enough to reach \$4,500 and by that evening, another donor raised the total to \$5,000 even. That is a fine tribute to the generosity of rockhounds.

The last day of the Wildacres was as full of activities as all the rest had been. In the morning, we had our final program by Bob Jones --- another great presentation. Then we had morning and afternoon silversmithing classes. Ann and I finished our third and fourth projects. Number three was a 30 mm x 40 mm cabochon with a silver bezel surrounding the cab and a silver backing. It was much more involved than our first two projects as we had to saw and trim a fairly thick flat silver sheet to size as a backing plus we worked with "fine silver" (the bezel) as well as with sterling (the backing). The final product was very handsome silver jewelry --- and we even "stamped" our creations with a tiny "Sterling" mark on the back. Neat.

Our fourth and last project was to design and create an all-metal collage pendant using silver, brass and copper – thus learning how different metals react to silver soldering. Our instructor Richard provided a large amount of scrap pieces of copper and brass to choose from. He pretty much gave us free reign to come up with our own ideas. Ann and I had quite different designs. By the end of the course, all of us were comfortable with the basics --- cleaning, fluxing and soldering silver/nonferrous metal; using the various machines – flex shafts, buffers/polishers, rolling mill; using the specialized hand tools in our toolboxes; and using a silversmith's workbench. Thankfully, throughout the course, Richard bailed just about all of us out of various difficulties – he is a very skilled and patient instructor.

That last afternoon toward the end of class, our classmates all chipped in and helped Richard return the classroom to pristine condition. We inventoried all the toolboxes, stacked the firebricks in their storage area, packed the Foredom tools, neutralized/emptied/cleaned the pickle pots, helped Richard organize his tools and items he had loaned us, emptied and cleaned out all the drawers in our benches, swept and cleaned the room, and returned the toolboxes and flex shafts to their storage cabinets upstairs. After we finished everything, our eight classmates took a picture of our completed third project --- eight hands each holding a silver encased cab.



Then off to dinner --- another delicious meal. And after dinner, we all gathered in the Meeting Room for "Show and Tell". Each of the various classes had set up table displays of what they had created during the week. The combined finished products of our silversmithing class was actually quite impressive. Each class elected a representative to explain what they had accomplished. Some of the "show and tells" became skits and were a bit crazy. Safety Matters- Kid Safety

Kid safety? Isn't kid safety the same as adult safety? Well, yes it is, more or less, and that is the crux of the matter — the "less" part that is. Kids are generally less — less experienced in matters of safety, less tall, less heavy, have smaller hands and overall, have smaller proportions than adults.

There are thus, some safety considerations when it comes to kid safety. Namely:

- 1. Some safety goggles are made of hard plastic or rubber. They do not easily conform to the smaller faces on kids. Solution: try using softer vinyl framed goggles which are flexible enough to properly t kid faces. Goggles with elastic head bands can easily be adjusted to t kids. If one is using safety glasses with side shields make sure the temples are sized to t kids. One would find it uncomfortable to have safety glasses keep sliding down the nose every time one looked downward and let's face it, looking downward is a large part of rock, mineral and fossil collecting.
- 2. Heavy duty work gloves in either large, or sometimes medium size are easily found in most stores. Heavy duty kid work gloves are not so easily found. Solution: try looking for ladies small-size heavy duty gloves. Sometimes the more well stocked suppliers will have smaller, heavy duty gloves.
- 3. Hard hats for kids? Sometimes I have seen the play hard hats, but never have I send down-scale hard hats that meet all the various ANSI or OSHA specifications. Solution: check out the adjustability of the head band and suspension system. Some are more adjustable than others. Seek one that can be adjusted to t smaller heads. The bene t is that a good hard hat can be adjusted to fit as the child grows.
- 4. Steel toe work shoes in smaller sizes? There again, in some specialty work clothes establishments one can find safety toe work boots that t smaller lady-size feet. The problem there is often finding the correct width, but with a little luck one might be successful in finding a safety shoe that fits. As fast as kids grow, it will be quite a trick to keep kids in proper safety footwear. The best

one can mostly hope for is just providing good sturdy work boots. Oh, there are steel and safety toe sneakers, so there may be some suitable

offerings there as well.

5. Kid appropriate tools? Sure, kids love to hammer on things. Can one find kid appropriate rock collecting tools? Solution: I have found none specifically made for kids, but what I have seen are what I call "travel tools", tools that are smaller -- less heavy rock picks, crack hammers, and chisels. Why does a kid need smaller tools? Well, smaller tools are more easily controlled in kid's smaller, less strong, and less coordinated hands. Mind that any use of tools should be suitably adult supervised. Along with tool use safety and first-aid kits should have kid-sized bandages packed in with all the adult-size bandages.

We like protecting our kids from harm. Large, dangerous working mines, quarries, pits and other hazardous commercial operations often limit kid entry. Insurance and liability requirements in operating facilities often dictate that no one under 18 is permitted on site.. Thus, kid specific safety gear is often not needed because kids are often not permitted inside. Common sense should reign in other collecting sites.

In general, safety requirements are similar for kids and adults – keeping hydrated, minding site specific rules and regulations, wearing safety goggles, and so on. The trick with kid safety, the one thing that makes it easier for adults is this one simple guideline: kids use adults as role models. If kids see their parents wearing goggles, they will want to as well, because it's the adult thing to do If kids see their parents using gloves, kids will want to as well. Kids learn from us, so if we adults set a good example, our work in keeping kids safe is made much easier. The bonus with that approach is that we say safe too (for our kids sake).

Please be safe out there, whether you are a kid, an adult or a kid-like adult!


