The Most Common Minerals on the Earth

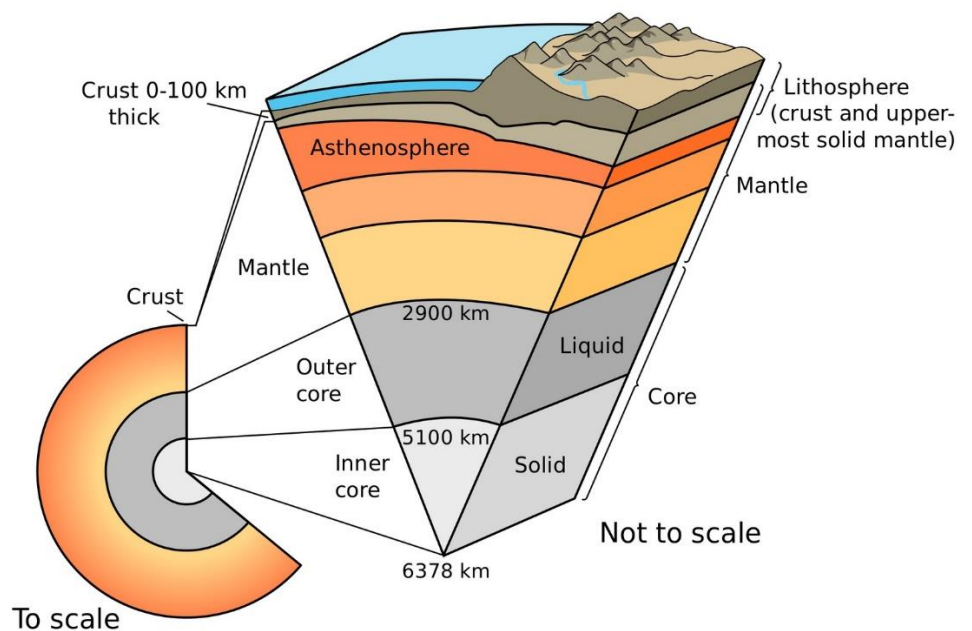

There are currently nearly 5000 minerals known to science, but only a few dozen are common enough to be found widespread throughout the Earth's crust. This article will explain a little bit about some of the most common minerals on the Earth and where they come from.

Inside the Earth

When we talk about the minerals found on the Earth we are talking about those that are found in the Earth's crust, the only part of the Earth really open for us to explore. The crust is a thin layer (up to 100km thick) under which lies the mantle and the upper (liquid) and lower (solid) core.



The Elements

All minerals are made up of a mixture of the 90 naturally occurring elements, and it comes as no surprise that the most common minerals are those that contain the most abundant elements in the Earth's crust.

Abundance of elements in the crust

WILDACRES

– Registration Begins January 1

Imagine yourself spending a week away from the hustle and bustle of life, the noise of car and truck horns, blaring radios, stories of crime blaring at you from the local news, and the pressures of everyday life. We have a wonderful opportunity to get away from all of the above and immerse yourself in relaxing, learning a new skill or two, and learning new things from a guest speaker.

Imagine – a week away in the mountains of North Carolina attending one or both of the 2020 EFMLS Workshops at Wildacres Retreat. Wildacres is a fantastic haven located on Pompey's Knob just off the Blue Ridge Parkway about an hour north of Asheville. The property consists of over 1,000 acres, much of which is truly kept "wild." Think rocking chairs, comfortable nights, starry skies, and great conversation!

The facility features two large lodges with private, motel style bedrooms (each with private bath), well equipped lapidary and jewelry studios and other classroom spaces, an auditorium, hiking trails, dining room and fantastic views of Mt. Mitchell and the surrounding Blue Ridge Mountains. Owned by a private foundation that allows non-profit groups such as ours to come for a few days for workshops that encourage the betterment of mankind. We've been privileged to be allowed to use the facility for the past 47 years. Think of Wildacres as summer camp, but without the tents.

Imagine - a week immersed in our hobby, getting to know others who share that hobby—whether you're interested in jewelry, lapidary or minerals. Each session consists of time for participants to take one or two classes (one 4-day class or two 2-day classes), hear excellent talks from our guest speaker --

Bob Jones for our Spring Session.

Bob Jones is a renowned author, speaker, prolific writer for Rock and Gem Magazine. He always enthralles audiences with his knowledge and effervescence presentations to audiences.

Join a field trip, explore the area, and participate in a variety of other activities. Our instructors, all volunteers are outstanding and bring with them a wealth of knowledge about their subject, lots of teaching experience and above all, patience!

Imagine – a week of no cooking, housekeeping, or errand running! The food is well-prepared, abundant and accommodating to special dietary needs. Meals are served family style in the very pleasant dining hall.

Dates for 2020 are May 18 – 24 and August 24 – 30. Fall classes will be announced later.

Feel free to make copies for your club members! Tuition for each session this year will be \$435 per person which includes your room and board for the week and gratuity for the Wildacres Retreat staff. You will be asked to pay your instructor(s) a materials fee, but that depends on what class or classes you select. Materials fees will be announced closer to the workshop session since costs, especially which of metals, do tend to change. Since some classes fill quickly, we ask that you include 4 options per "semester". Field Trips

TRIP: This is an old alluvial deposit containing rocks eroded from the Appalachian Mountains since their formation 400 million years ago. This site is an old gravel quarry that is now producing natural gas field.

COLLECTING: Material at Brookwood is primarily water smoothed pebbles of mixed size from teeny to baking potato size. We will be looking for petrified wood, jasper, agate, crazy blue lace, and oolite. This site has an abundance of water smoothed quartz pebbles shaped like a double-sided cabochon. Small amounts of many other types of rock are found including petrified wood, jasper, agate, marine fossils, Indian paint pots and any number of other unknown materials. Lots of great tumbling material but some is suitable for cutting.

BRING: Sack lunch, plenty of drinks, buckets or bags for specimens, hammer, screwdriver (or something similar to pry the rock out of the surface). No real digging involved although people bring shovels to put many rocks into their buckets. **Limit two 5 gallon buckets.** Wear appropriate dress, hat, good gloves, and sunscreen.

CHILDREN: Kids are allowed with adult supervision. This trip is not recommended for children under 5 years old.

PETS: No pets allowed.

FACILITIES: There will be a port-a-potty available.

TERRAIN & ACCESSIBILITY: It is fairly level with some hills if you choose to climb. It should not be a problem for people with mobility issues. People can park right at the areas they want to collect.

REQUIREMENTS: All tools, equipment, and ponds are strictly off limits. The AFMS/SFMS code of ethics should be strictly observed (click [here](#) to read them). The property owner has been generous to let us collect here for many years and we would not want anything to jeopardize that.

WAIVER FORMS MUST BE SIGNED BEFORE YOU DIG!!!

Please check in at the club table when you arrive at the site and before you leave so we can keep count of who is there. We do not want anyone to get locked in the gate!!

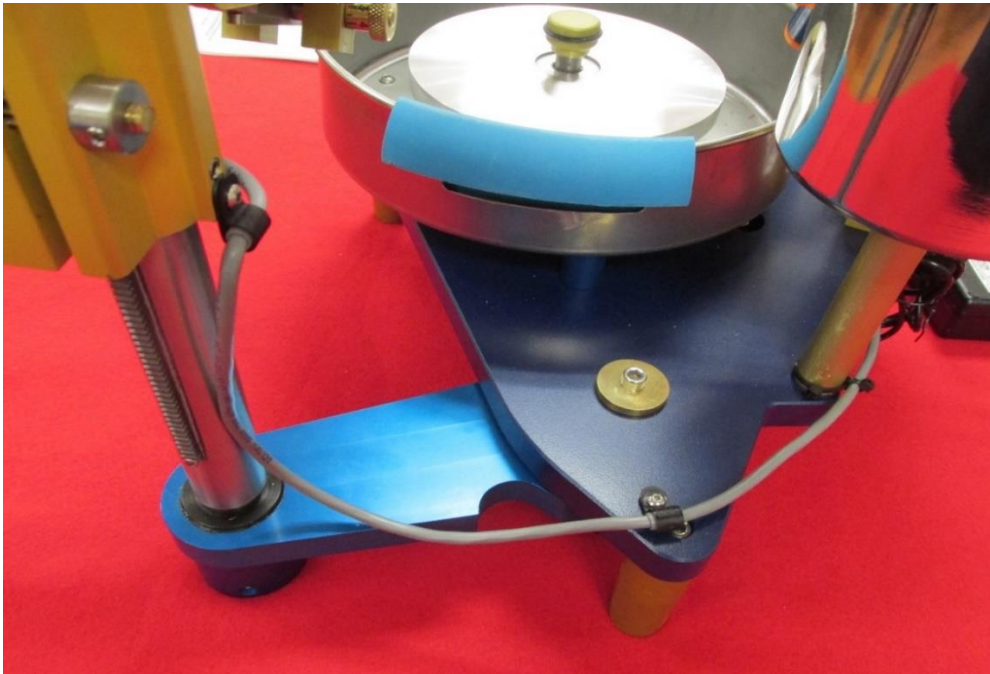
51. “Jersey Instrument”. A Mast Type Faceting Machine. One of the newest, very robust faceting machines; the design originated in Australia. Note the **Direction of Rotation Control** and the variable **Speed Control**, features found on most electric powered faceting machines. Some gems have “grain” that makes polishing certain facets difficult. Changing the direction of rotation during the polishing of a facet sometimes diminishes the problem.



52. “Hall”. An early Laurie Hall Mast Type Faceting Machine from Australia with **No Slide Base**. A second arm allows faceting in the “working area” of the Lap as the Height is changed. (See #26.) Hall made a number of improvements to faceting machines and a number of unique well-liked machine designs although reportedly, he never cut a gem.



53. "Omni-E" by Jersey Instruments. A Mast Type Faceting Machine with No Slide Base. This is the second faceting machine by Jersey Instruments. Jersey Instruments purchased the design from Laurie Hall and made modifications.



54. "Omni-E" no-slide-base detail. Jersey Instruments is in the final testing stages of their third faceting machine.
