Honoring a Legend: David Callahan

Dave, No amount of words can ever express our gratitude for what you have done for the Gem and Mineral society of Lynchburg. Everything in this award is a testament to you and your contributions throughout the years you have been a part of the club. The wood was provided by Steve Gordon. It comes from a very old mahogany log that was found near Mt. Athos in a creek. The log was hand hewn by me and I hope the design reflects the amount of precision and care that you put in all that you do.

We had been searching for the perfect specimens to add to this piece for a while. They needed to be something that spoke to us and be representative of you. Thom and Linda Noble and I made a trip to David Lipscomb's shop, Virginia Rock Shop in Afton, VA. It was there that we discovered these two specimens and we knew they were just the right ones for you. The first specimen was purchased from the collection of David Lipscomb. It is a naturally rare form of Calcite and Chalcopyrite. It was collected in the 90's from the 1,100 foot level, drift 106 from Brushy Creek Mine, in Reynolds County, Missouri. It was chosen for you because of its natural rarity just as you are rare and genuine to us.



The second specimen is amazonite and smoky quartz from Pikes Peak, Colorado. It was selected because of the ingenuity and time that you have put into creating the spheres. The careful and meticulous design process, fabrication, and end product of the machines that you have created has enabled the club to produce handmade spheres for everyone to enjoy. The glass was selected, maybe purely by name as it is jade glass, but as well in a representation of the faceted stones that you create. The opaque green glass is Jade-ite which simulates the light Jade gemstone. I selected an angular design to represent the works of art that you have created through faceting.

Even though I know it's tempting, I hope you leave this piece of "Visionite" as you would call it, alone. Linda Noble put a lot of thought and care into choosing the perfect wording to summarize, but not limit how we all feel about you.

This award is a representation of the love and respect that the club feels for you and all the years you have hosted the workshop, dedicating your time and energy to the betterment of this club. Your years of commitment, comradery, mentorship, generosity, hospitality and longtime support to the Gem and Mineral Society of Lynchburg are greatly appreciated.
