

Learn to create a visual record that captures and reveals semi-transparency, inclusions and other internal structures, reflectivity and sparkle in your mineral or gemstone collection.

Ancient Wonder of Archaeology, Art History & Architecture

Cave Pearls form when water dripping into a cave loses carbon dioxide and precipitates calcite. A cave pearl forms when the water is moving too vigorously to form stalagmite. A nucleus of matter (such as a grain of sand) becomes coated with calcite, and the current then provides a rotation to the nucleus in such a way that it is coated evenly. In this manner concentric layers build up over time, in much the same way that biological pearls forms within a mollusk (Oyster). There may be microbial action involved in the formation of cave pearls.
